7. **Bachelor's degree training objectives and professional competences**

The objective of the international relations undergraduate programme is the training of intellectuals who are capable of navigating the world of international relations, of appropriately representing national and regional interests, sensitive to global issues, capable of handling the challenges of the European integration process, and open to learning about other cultures who can work in Hungarian or international corporate, governmental, and non-governmental organisations in international communications, creative problem-handling, and the flexible solution of complex tasks, and are prepared to continue their training at the Master's level.

7.1. Attained professional competences

7.1.1. The International Relations Expert has

a) knowledge

- Is knowledgeable regarding the generally accepted tendencies, characteristics and data of Hungarian and international political, economic, and cultural phenomena.
- Interprets the field's international, European, and regional political, legal, economic, and civilisational knowledge and events in their context.
- Is knowledgeable regarding the current research questions and analytic and interpretive methods of social sciences.
- Knows the basic terms and the important concepts of the various fields of the profession and understands interrelationships.
- Knows the ways, tools, and techniques of international communications.
- Knows the operations, scopes, and policies of the European Union Institutions.

b) skills

- Is capable of learning and systemising information independently in historical, social, economic, legal, and political issues.
- Reads the literature, especially the technical terminology, in at least two foreign languages.
- Is capable of navigating international contexts, of following, understanding, and processing processes and changes, its efficient and successful sharing and practical use.

- Is capable of interpreting international relations from the viewpoint of at least one non-European culture.
- Is capable of project-based work, has the ability to share work and cooperate, recognises individual contributions to shared successes.
- Is capable of performing written analyses independently and of presenting completed tasks in written or oral form to a professional audience.
- Is capable and able to perform tasks related to appearance in international cooperation in small and medium enterprises, and of performing tasks from international cooperations in the multinational and corporate sectors.

8. Bachelor's degree characteristics**8.1. Professional properties****8.1.1. The scientific fields and areas that the training is based on are:**

- general social science knowledge and competences [Economics, Introduction to Law, Philosophy, Political Science, Sociology, History (Modern Hungarian and World History) Informatics] 20-60 credits;
- methodological and skills development knowledge (Statistics, Social Statistics, Qualitative and Quantitative Methodology, Terminology Exercises) 20-30 credits;
- professional skills related to international relations: 50-100 credits, including the credit value of the thesis, as per the following:
 - the history of international relations [The History of International Relationships from 1815 to 1989, The History of Hungarian Foreign Policy, The History of Diplomacy, International Relations in the New World Order (from 1989)] 5-40 credits;
 - the theory and practice of international politics (The Main Schools of International Political Theory, The Theory and Practice of Diplomacy) 5-40 credits;
 - international law (International Public Law, International Civil Law, International Treaties, International Institutions and Organisations) 5-40 credits;
 - international economics (International Economics, Foreign Economic Policy, International Finance, World Economy, International Business Economics) 5-40 credits;

- regional-civilisational studies (History of Civilization, History of European Civilization, Regional Studies) 5-40 credits;
- the European Union (The Developmental History of the European Union, EU Institutions and Decision-making, EU Law, EU Jurisdictions and Policies, Hungary in the European Union, European Union Tender Writing and Project Management) 5-40 credits;
- the practice of international relations (Techniques of International Communication, International Events, Diplomatic Protocol, Negotiation Techniques) 5-40 credits.

8.1.2. Specialisation recommended by the educational institution constitutes theoretical and practical knowledge that is capable of working on the given field, improves personal abilities, and results in specialised competences relevant to individual interests. In the entirety of the programme, trade-specific knowledge accounts for 30-35 credits.

8.2. Specific features that distinguish the training

In order to obtain the qualification in the initial training, an intermediate level (level B2) of foreign language proficiency in at least two foreign languages is required, one of which is the level of foreign language proficiency in the specialised field.

8.3. Internship requirements

The internship is a continuous internship of at least 120 hours (4 weeks) as defined in the curriculum of the course, which is recommended in the sixth semester, but can be completed after the completion of 2 active semesters or 50 credits.

9. Degree thesis/ Dissertation

The aim of the degree thesis is to demonstrate the student's knowledge and expertise in a chosen topic, scientific data collection, systematization, analysis and processing related to the chosen topic, discussion of the chosen phenomenon or problem, hypothesis creation, problem solving, analysis of alternative hypotheses, argumentation and in refuting the counter-arguments, in a coherent, consistent, language-oriented written explanation of his thoughts, views, positions, statements.

11. Foreign language competence in a specialised language other than English:

The acquisition of foreign language competence in a specialised language other than the language of training may be achieved by completing the "foreign language competence I." course of a 0 credit value and a signed, non-contact-hour criterion course. This subject is included in the penultimate semester of the degree programme, but is recommended to be taken in the bachelor program from the 5th semester onwards.

Expected level: An accredited complex exam - assessing writing, reading, listening and speaking skills - in a modern foreign language for specific purposes at CEFR B2 level or above (in the field of the relevant university programme)."

12. Requirements for the issue of a final certificate

The University will issue a final certificate to the student who has obtained

- the study and examination regulation prescribed in the curriculum, and
- the required internship (professional experience),
- the required credits.

13. Conditions for admission to the final examination

Joint conditions for admission to the final exam:

- a) obtaining a final certificate,
- b) submission of the dissertation by the deadline,
- c) evaluation of the dissertation with a different grade than the deadline,
- d) registration for the final exam by the deadline,
- e) the student has no overdue payment debt to the University for the given training,
- f) accounted for with assets owned by the University (borrowed books, sports equipment, etc.).

A student who has not fulfilled any of the provisions of the points a)-f) cannot be admitted to the final examination.

14. Parts of the final exam

The final exam consists of the defense of the dissertation and the oral comprehensive examination.

- Journey of the European Integration: Milestones and Driving Forces

15. Determining the result of the final exam

The result of the final examination, that is, the grade awarded for the final examination, is the arithmetic average of the grades received for the parts specified in paragraphs (a), (b) and (c), rounded to two decimal places.

- a) the grade for the thesis awarded by the referee(s) on a five-grade scale, in the case of more than one referees, the average of the grades given by the referees rounded to two decimal places and
- b) the grade received for defending the thesis and for answering the questions related to the thesis, graded on a five-grade scale, as well as
- c) the grade received for the comprehensive examination on a five-scale grade (if it consists of a written and oral part, the average of the two grades rounded to two decimal places) with double weight.

16. Components of diploma qualification, method of calculation

the result of the diploma shall be constituted of the arithmetic average of the following items, rounded to two decimal places:

- a) the credit-weighted (arithmetic) average of grades received in compulsory and compulsory elective subjects in the amount stipulated in the curriculum (if the student took more compulsory elective subjects than required, then of all completed subjects) and
- b) the result (grade) of the final examination.

17. Conditions for issuing a diploma

A prerequisite for the award of a diploma certifying the completion of higher education is a successful final examination.

Curriculum

- It is recommended to include the subjects in the schedule according to the sample curriculum. The student may deviate from this, taking into account:
1. the pre-study order,
 2. semester of announcing subjects
 3. completion of an average of 30 credits per semester
 4. in addition to the compulsory subjects, students may take elective subjects from the offer of elective subjects (see Neptun) as well as foreign languages.
 5. a minimum of 2/3 of the required amount of credit must be completed at Corvinus University.

Courses taken in German all have equivalent courses in English.
